Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. (RCPC) (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statements of financial position as of June 30, 2023, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. as of June 30, 2023, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America (GAAS) and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States (*Government Auditing Standards*). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of the Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinions.

Other Matters

The financial statements of Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. for the year ended June 30, 2022 were audited by another auditor. In their report dated March 16, 2023, they expressed an unmodified opinion on those financial statements.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statement

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; and for the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about the Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc.'s ability to continue as a going concern for one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations, or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to
 fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures
 include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial
 statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures
 that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the
 effectiveness of the Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc.'s internal control. Accordingly,
 no such opinion is expressed.

 accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the
 financial statements.

Notes to Financial Statements

Years Ended June 30, 2023 and 2022

NOTE 1 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

This summary of significant accounting policies of Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. (the Organization) is presented to assist in understanding the Organization's financial statements. The financial statements and notes are representations of the Organization's management, who is responsible for their integrity and objectivity. These accounting policies conform to accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America and have been consistently applied in the preparation of the financial statements.

Organization - Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc., located in Fairbanks, Alaska, was organized in 1973 as a nonprofit corporation. The primary purpose of the Organization is to reduce the incidence of child maltreatment and neglect through community education, treatment and support services to families and the community. The Organization is funded primarily by grants from the State of Alaska Department of Health and Social Services.

Estimates - The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reported period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Basis of accounting - The accompanying financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting and accordingly, reflect all significant receivables, payables and other liabilities.

Basis of presentation - Financial statement presentation follows the recommendations of Financial Accounting Standards Board Accounting Standards Codification (FASB ASC) 958 *Not-For-Profit Entities* and FASB Accounting Standards Update 2016-14, *Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities*, which require the Organization to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to two classes of net assets based on the existence or absence of donor imposed restrictions. Additionally, the Organization is required to present statements of functional expenses and cash flows. Net assets and changes therein are classified and reported as follows:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions - Net assets available for use in general operations and not subject to donor restrictions. Net assets without donor restrictions may be designated for specific purposes by action of the Board of Directors. It is the policy of the Board of Directors of the Organization to review its operating revenue and expenses annually and to designate appropriate sums of net assets without donor restrictions as a contingency or operating reserve to assure adequate availability of assets for operating activities.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions - Some donor-imposed restrictions may be temporary in nature such as those that will be met by the passage of time or other events specified by the donor. Other donor-imposed restrictions may be perpetual in nature, where the donor stipulates that resources be maintained in perpetuity. Donor-imposed restrictions are released when a restriction expires, that is, when the stipulated time has elapsed, when the stipulated purpose for which the resource was restricted has been fulfilled, or both.

Notes to Financial Statements, Continued

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Cash - For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the Organization considers all savings accounts and short-term investments with maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Receivables and allowance of doubtful accounts - Receivables are recorded on the accrual basis when the goods and services are delivered, and are considered delinquent or uncollectible on a case-by-case basis by management. The Organization records an allowance for doubtful accounts for the estimated uncollectible portion of the year-end accounts receivable based on management's historical collection experience and a review of current accounts receivable. It is the Organization's policy to charge off uncollectible accounts receivable when management determines the receivable will not be collected. Grants receivable are recorded monthly or quarterly, as costs are determined to be allowable according to each particular grantor's guidelines.

Property and equipment - Through June 30, 2013, property and equipment with an acquisition cost of \$500 or more were recorded at cost when purchased or at fair value at the date of gift. Effective July 1, 2013, the \$500 capitalization threshold was increased to \$2,000. Gifts of property and equipment are reported as unrestricted support unless explicit donor stipulations specify how the donated assets must be used. Gifts of long-lived assets with explicit restriction that specify how the assets are to be used and gifts of cash or other assets that must be used to acquire long-lived assets are reported as restricted support. Depreciation is recorded on the straight-line basis over the estimated useful life of the asset. The cost of any asset sold or otherwise disposed of is eliminated from the accounts, and any resulting gain or loss is included in operations. Expenditures for maintenance and repairs of equipment are charged against operations. Renewals or betterments that significantly extend the life of an asset are capitalized.

Leases - The Organization has adopted FASB ASC 842, Leases, with a date of initial application June 30, 2023. For leases with a term greater than one year, the Organization recognizes a lease asset for its rightto-use the underlying leased asset and a lease liability for the corresponding lease obligation. The Organization determines whether an arrangement is or contains a lease at contract inception. Operating leases with a duration greater than one year are included in operating lease right-to-use assets, current portion operating lease liabilities and operating lease liabilities, net of current portion in the Organization's Statement of Financial Position. Operating lease right-of-use assets and operating lease liabilities are recognized at the lease commencement date based on the present value of lease payments over the lease term. In determining the present value of lease payments, the Organization uses an incremental borrowing rate comparable with that of the lease term. The Organization considers the lease term to be the noncancelable period that it has the right to use the underlying asset, including all periods covered by an option to (1) extend the lease if the Organization is reasonably certain not to exercise the option, (2) terminate the lease if the Organization is reasonably certain not to exercise that option, and (3) extend, or not to terminate, the lease in which exercise of the option is controlled by the lessor. The operating lease right-of-use assets also include any lease payments made and exclude lease incentives received or receivable. Lease expense is recognized on a straight-line basis over the expected lease term. Variable lease expenses are recorded when incurred.

Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. has elected the short-term lease exemption for all leases with a term of 12 months or less for both existing and ongoing operating leases to not recognize the asset and liability for these leases. Lease payments for short-term leases are recognized on a straight-line basis.

Notes to Financial Statements, Continued

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Revenue recognition – Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets to the Organization are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received. Conditional promises to give – that is, those with a measureable performance or other barrier and a right of return – are not recognized until the conditions on which they depend have been met. Unconditional contributions received are recorded as with donor restriction or without donor restriction, depending on the existence and nature of any donor restrictions. When a restriction expires, net assets with donor restriction are reclassified as net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions. If a restriction is met in the same period that the contribution is received, the contribution is recorded as without donor restriction.

Grants are either recognized as contributions or exchange transactions based on criteria contained in each grant award. For grant awards recognized as exchange transactions, revenue is recognized in the accounting period when the related allowable expenses are incurred. Amounts received in excess of expenses are reflected as deferred revenue. Grants qualifying as contributions are reported at fair value and are recognized as either unconditional or conditional contributions. Unconditional contributions are recognized in the period the funding is received, and conditional contributions are recognized when the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met.

The Organization has adopted the provisions of Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2014-09 *Revenue with Contracts with Customers* (Topic 606) as management believes the standard improves the usefulness and understandability of the Organization's financial reporting. The Organization has not identified any significant judgements and there has been no variable consideration assessed by management under current contracts with customers. Analyses of various provisions of the standard resulted in no significant changes in the way the Organization recognizes revenue, and therefore no changes to the previously issued audited financial statements were required on a retrospective basis.

Donated Goods and Services - Many volunteers have made significant contributions of their time to develop and promote the programs of the Organization. Donated services are recognized as contributions in accordance with FASB ASC 958, *Accounting for Contributions Received and Contributions Made*, if the services (1) create or enhance nonfinancial assets or (2) require specialized skills, are performed by people with those skills, and would otherwise be purchased by the Organization. Contributions of materials and supplies for operating activities are recorded as revenue and expenses in the Statement of Activities and Changes in Net Assets at fair value on the date of contribution. Materials and supplies contributed for fundraising purposes are recorded initially at their fair market value. The difference between fair market value of the contribution amount and amount received for those items from the ultimate recipient is recognized as an adjustment to the original contribution amount.

Fair value for materials and supplies is based on current retail prices of identical or similar products in the Fairbanks, Alaska area. Fair value for professional services is based on current rates for similar services provided by similar professionals (as those donating professional services to the Organization). If the fair value is not readily available, an estimated fair value is used.

Notes to Financial Statements, Continued

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

The Organization follows Accounting Standards Update (ASU) No. 2020-07, *Presentation and Disclosures by Not-for-Profit Entities for Contributed Nonfinancial Assets, and* presents contributed nonfinancial assets as a separate line item in the Statement of Activities, apart from contributions of cash or other financial assets. This standard also requires additional disclosures related to contributed nonfinancial assets, including disaggregating by category the types of contributed nonfinancial assets a nonprofit entity has received. Adoption of this standard did not have a significant impact on the financial statements, with the exception of the additional disclosure requirements.

Functional allocation of expenses - FASB ASC 958 Not-For-Profit Entities requires all nonprofit Organizations to provide information about expenses reported by their functional classification, according to the purpose for which the expenses are incurred. The primary functional expense classifications are program services and supporting activities (management and general, and fundraising). Program services expenses are the direct and indirect costs related to providing community education, treatment and support services to families and the community. Management and general expenses are not directly identifiable with any specific program or fundraising activity, but are indispensable to the conduct of those activities and to the overall support and direction of the Organization. Fundraising expenses are activities undertaken to induce potential donors to contribute money, services, materials, facilities, other assets, or time.

Certain categories of expenses are attributable to more than one functional expense classification, and are allocated on the basis of periodic time and expense studies that are consistently applied. Allocated expenses include: personnel expense, travel, equipment, contractual, and other which are allocated on the basis of estimates of time and effort, and supplies, facilities, insurance, and depreciation which are all allocated based on an estimated usage study.

a) Program Activities

<u>Family Services</u> - Personnel, facility, supplies, equipment, contractual, insurance, and other program expenses to provide case management and other support services for parents and children.

<u>Child Advocacy Center</u> - Personnel, facility, supplies, equipment, contractual, insurance, and other program expenses to provide evaluations of child sexual abuse, and support and advocacy for children and their non-offending family members.

<u>Women, Infants and Children</u> - Personnel, facility, supplies, equipment, contractual, insurance, and other program expenses to provide nutrition education and support services. This program was discontinued in FY23.

<u>Behavioral Health Services</u> – Supplies and insurance expenses to provide support for the behavioral health of the community and its children.

<u>Program Support</u> - Personnel, facility, supplies, equipment, contractual, and other program expenses to provide program support to the Organization's primary program services.

b) Supporting Activities

<u>Management and General</u> - Includes the functions necessary to maintain equitable employment; ensure an adequate working environment; provide coordination of the Organization's programs; secure proper administrative functioning of the Board of Directors; and manage the financial and budgetary responsibilities of the Organization.

<u>Fundraising</u> – Provides the structure necessary to encourage and secure private financial support from individuals, foundations and corporations.

Notes to Financial Statements, Continued

NOTE 1 - SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Income taxes - The Organization is a tax-exempt corporation under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code and accordingly, no provision for income taxes is included in the financial statements. FASC ASC 740 Accounting for Uncertainty in Income Taxes requires the Organization to recognize a liability for uncertain tax positions when a liability, if any, would more likely than not be assessed by a taxing authority. Management evaluated the Organization's tax positions and determined there are no liabilities required to be recognized as a result of uncertain tax positions. Income tax returns are open for examination by tax authorities for three years from the date they were filed. The years that remain open for examination begins with 2020.

Fair Value Measurement of Financial Instruments - The Organization has adopted the provisions of FASB ASC 820 which establishes the framework for measuring fair value of assets and liabilities, and requires disclosures about fair value measurements applicable to financial assets and liabilities, as well as for other assets and liabilities that are carried at fair value on a recurring basis. Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction in the principal, or most advantageous, market at the measurement date under current market conditions regardless of whether that price is directly observable or estimated using another valuation technique.

Subsequent events - In preparing these financial statements, the Organization has evaluated events and transactions for potential recognition or disclosure through March 18, 2024.

NOTE 2 - CERTIFICATE OF DEPOSIT

At June 30, 2023 and 2022, the Organization held \$25,979 and \$25,979, respectively, in a certificate of deposit (CD) at Denali State Bank. The CD matured August 26, 2023, at which time it was renewed for another one-year term at a rate of 5.0 percent annually. The CD is security for the Organization's line of credit with Denali State Bank (see Note 12).

NOTE 5 - CONTRIBUTED USE OF PROPERTY

The Organization leases 13,456 square feet of office space in the Wise Family Center from the Interior Alaska Center for Non-Violent Living (IAC) for \$1 per square foot per month. The estimated fair value of the office space is \$2.00 per square foot, determined by review of current local listing rates for other similar office space in Fairbanks, Alaska. The terms of the agreement, entered into in 2020, provide for use of the office space for 3 years from the time the agreement was signed, and ending on June 30, 2023. The contributed portion of the use of the office space is \$161,472 annually. On July 1, 2023, the lease converted to a month-to-month agreement.

NOTE 9 - NET ASSETS WITH DONOR RESTRICTIONS

Donor restricted net assets limited for use in future periods or for specified purposes consist of time restricted United Way funds and the contributed use of property to be utilized over the lease term. During the years ended June 2023 and 2022, with the passage of time and receipt of the promises to give, the United Way restrictions were met and releases of \$40,328 and \$27,374, respectively, from net assets with donor restrictions were recorded. During the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, with the passage of time, the restrictions on the contributed use of property were met and releases of \$156,532 and \$156,532, respectively, from net assets with donor restrictions were recorded, representing the annual fair value of the use of property of \$161,472 as annual rent expense net of the related annual discounts of \$4,940.

NOTE 10 - EMPLOYEE BENEFIT PLANS

The Organization offers a Section 125 cafeteria plan (flexible benefits plan) whereby participants may direct portions of their salaries to support certain benefits payable under the plan. The plan is available to all employees, and includes accident and health insurance.

The Organization also offers a Qualified Small Employer Health Reimbursement Arrangement (QSEHRA) whereby employees pay for their own health expenses and the Organization reimburses them up to the amount of the Organization's set reimbursement allowance. This program was discontinued as of June 30, 2023.

NOTE 11 - LEASE COMMITMENTS

The Organization sub-leases space in the Wise Family Center from the Interior Alaska Center for Non-Violent Living (IAC), with monthly lease payments based on IAC's operational costs of the sublet property's square footage. In July 2020 the lease was renewed for a three-year period beginning July 1, 2020, and continuing through June 30, 2023, and required monthly lease payments of \$13,456 for the duration of the three year lease period. Monthly lease payments were \$13,456 and \$13,456 for the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, respectively. Total amounts paid in 2023 and 2022 were \$161,472 and \$161,472, respectfully. On July 1, 2023, the lease converted to a month-to-month agreement. See Note 5.

NOTE 12 - LINE OF CREDIT

The Organization has a revolving line of credit with Denali State Bank with a limit of \$25,000 which was entered into on October 19, 2011, and accrues interest at 7.0 percent. The line of credit is secured by the Organization's \$25,000 certificate of deposit at Denali State Bank. As of June 30, 2023 and 2022, the outstanding balances on the line of credit were \$5,493 and \$13,364, respectively.

NOTE 13 - CONCENTRATIONS OF CREDIT RISK

The Organization maintains a money market account, which at times during the year, has exceeded federal deposit insurance limits. At June 30, 2023 and 2022 cash balances exceeded federally insured limits by \$283,441 and \$59,333, respectively. The Organization has not experienced any losses in such account, and believes it is not exposed to any significant credit risk on cash.

NOTE 14 - ECONOMIC DEPENDENCE

The Organization receives significant state and federal funding through the State of Alaska Department of Health and Social Services and the U.S. Department of Justice. During the years ended June 30, 2023 and 2022, the Organization received approximately 84% and 84%, respectively, of its support from government grant awards. Significant changes in these sources of support could have a material effect on the operations of the Organization.

NOTE 15 - CONTINGENCIES

The Organization participates in several federal and state grant programs that are subject to audits by the grantors or their representatives. Such audits could lead to a request for reimbursement to the grantor agency for expenditures disallowed under terms of the grant. Management believes such disallowances, if any would be immaterial.

Independent Auditor's Report

We have audited, in accordance with the auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States, the financial statements of Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc. (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2023, and the related statements of activities and changes in net assets, functional expenses, and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements, and have issued our report thereon dated March 18, 2024.

Report on Internal Control Over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements, we considered Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc.'s internal control over financial reporting (internal control) as a basis for designing audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc.'s internal control. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of Resource Center for Parents and Children, Inc.'s internal control.

A deficiency in internal control exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, misstatements on a timely basis. A material weakness is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control, such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected and corrected on a timely basis. A significant deficiency is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.

Our consideration of internal control was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be material weaknesses or significant deficiencies.
